Why is it so difficult for us to catch our own errors?

It all comes down to confirmation bias, a type of cognitive bias we're all subject to. Confirmation bias is the human brain's tendency to interpret and recall information in a way that confirms our internal concepts. At the same time, we're wired to ignore or discount any evidence to the contrary. So that means if you write something and then go back over it to look for mistakes, your brain is not

going to cooperate. Instead, it's going to focus on the overall concepts you were trying to convey, filling in the blanks and autocorrecting errors for you.

This means that some errors are almost inevitable when self-editing. But even small errors can detract from the quality of your writing, making it hard for readers to focus on your message.

2) Improving Clarity and Readability:

Editing improves the clarity and readability of your writing by:

- eliminating unnecessary words
- simplifying complex sentences
- organizing your ideas in a logical way

It makes your writing easier to understand and more enjoyable to read. Editing also helps avoid any unclear language that may distract or frustrate your readers.

3) Ensuring Consistency:

Consistency is so important in writing. It establishes a logical flow for your readers. Yet, for many of us, it can be hard to see flaws in consistency in our own work. Editing helps ensure consistency in:
